## **Part II: Research, Teaching, and Clinical Contributions**

### **A. A Narrative Report of Research, Teaching, and Clinical Contributions**

I am a pediatrician, educator, researcher, and filmmaker, who has developed novel research methods, implemented large and small scale educational initiatives, and collaborated with health organizations and national policymakers to protect child health. I founded and direct the Center on Media and Child Health (CMCH), an interdisciplinary group of scientists, clinicians, and educators that focuses on the influences of entertainment and communications media on the physical, mental, and social health of children and adolescents.

I developed an innovative research methodology, Video Intervention/Prevention Assessment (VIA), which uses patient-created visual illness narratives to investigate the illness experience. VIA methodology has been detailed in peer-reviewed medical and scientific journals, the *Encyclopedia of Qualitative Research Methods*, and several books on research methods. I was asked to write a special article on qualitative methods for the *Journal of Adolescent Health*, have been teaching workshops and leading a Special Interest Group at Society for Adolescent Medicine (SAM) national meetings since 1996, and have trained health researchers across the US, Canada, Mexico, Britain, and Australia. I was awarded the SAM New Investigator Award for using VIA to investigate pediatric asthma, a study that generated the first paper to be published with video in *Pediatrics*. VIA has effectively revealed the worlds in which patients manage medical conditions, educating the health community, teaching patients and families about living with illness, and sensitizing the general public to the realities of chronic disease through national broadcasts on ABC World News Tonight, National Public Radio, and Primetime Live.

I have served on the American Academy of Pediatrics' (AAP) Committee on Public Education and the Editorial Board of *Pediatrics*, authoring four AAP policy statements on media. I have testified to the U.S. Congress, Illinois and North Carolina State Legislatures, and the Chicago City Council, as well as co-authored Federal legislation authorizing funding for health research on media effects. Visiting Professorships have included the Morris Blum Professorship (University of Minnesota), Rutherford B. Polhill Professorship (University of Alabama), and the AAP CATCH Professorship at Schneider Children's Hospital. I have sat on expert panels for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, National Institute of Child Health and Human Development, and National Institute of Mental Health. I translate scientific and clinical knowledge into guidance for children, parents, educators, and clinicians on Advisory Boards of PBS Kids and *Parents* magazine, the National Television Oversight Monitoring Board, and as a Senior Fellow of the Fred M. Rogers Center for Early Learning and Children's Media. My work as a teacher, researcher and leader have been prominently featured in books such as *Talking Their Way into Science*, *Using Software in Qualitative Research*, and *Work 2.0* and in hundreds

of print, radio, and television press appearances. I have been honored with the AAP's Holroyd-Sherry Award for "outstanding contributions that have demonstrated that media's influence on child and adolescent health is an important public health issue."

As a Scholar of the Academy at HMS, I have worked on developing VIA into interactive audiovisual curriculum, taught Patient-Doctor and outpatient management skills, and, since 2003, been Course Director of Adolescent Health at HSPH. I have written chapters for *Children and Television: 50 Years of Research* and a forthcoming textbook from the Annenberg Public Policy Center, senior authored a comprehensive report reviewing media influences on children 0-6 for the Kaiser Family Foundation, a chapter for a Blackwell psychology text, and an article for *Pediatrics in Review*, and co-edited an issue of *Adolescent Medicine State of the Art Reviews*. Mentees include David Bickham, PhD (faculty at CMCH pursuing research on media influences on bullying and victimization), John P. Murray, PhD (professor at Kansas State University, using fMRI to find biological bases for behavioral responses to media), and Gretchen Berland, MD (used patient-controlled video to make a documentary on disability that garnered her a MacArthur "genius grant"). Under my leadership, CMCH has collected (from 13 disciplines), abstracted, and catalogued the only comprehensive library of research on media effects, which is accessible on the Web by both professionals and families, produces an up-to-the-minute research blog, and publishes a monthly e-newsletter to help parents translate the latest knowledge into good parenting. I have established CMCH as the first interdisciplinary center of excellence conducting and collecting scientific research on the positive and negative effects of media exposure, developing and evaluating media-based prevention strategies and intervention tools, and training clinicians, educators, and researchers to provide accurate, current information with which to teach children, adolescents, and families how to achieve and maintain optimal health in the Media Age.
